

- 2 British course host of a Ryder Cup with Ben Hogan the non-playing captain of the American team.
- US Open course where wicker baskets are used instead of flags on each green.
- Tour stop affectionately known as 'Arnie's Place'.
- Home of the famous 'Pew Bunkers'.
- The last course outside of Queensland to host the Australian PGA Championship.
- 11 Victorian Gippsland course where Greg Norman won twice in the late 1970s.
- 12 Site of Tiger Woods' first PGA Tour appearance as an amateur.
- 15 Famous depression short of the 18th green on St Andrews Old Course.
- 17 Mornington Peninsula course that hosted an Australian PGA Championship.
- 20 Alister MacKenzie-designed course that has hosted several major New Zealand championships. 21 Birthplace of The Open Championship.
- 23 Open Championship venue that starts with a par-3.
- 24 The first course added to the Tournament Players Club (TPC) network.
- 25 Caribbean Tom Fazio design that hosted a World Golf Championship event.
- 26 English course where Gene Sarazen unveiled his game-changing sand wedge in 1932.

- 27 One of the five founding member clubs of the United States Golf Association.
- 28 Long-time home of the Australian Masters.
- 29 Surname, original designer of Dutch Open venue Hilversumsche.
- 30 Brisbane course where South African Bobby Locke won the Australian Open.

- Designer of the Renaissance Club, which was due to host the Scottish Open in July.
- Turnberry course The Open Championship is played on.
- United Arab Emirates course at Jumeirah Estates designed by Greg Norman.
- NSW resort course that once hosted European Tour co-sanctioned tournament.
- New York major championship venue with two Donald Ross-designed courses.
- 10 The longest course to ever host a major championship.
- 13 Home course of the legendary Bobby Jones.
- 14 Home of the now defunct Fiji International event.
- 16 One of three courses used every year for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am.
- 18 What is the nickname of the 8th hole at Royal Troon.
- 19 C.H Alison-designed Japanese course.
- 22 Former host course of the Open de France.
